Our increasingly interconnected world with highly mobile individuals, dependent food and medical supply chains and globalized economies creates a progressively vulnerable environment for rapid onset epidemics and pandemics. A single localized outbreak in a remote village can now become a global health crisis. Global health security is about making the world safer and more secure from these threats.

GLOBAL HEALTH SECURITY AGENDA

The Global Health Security Agenda (GHSA) seeks to accelerate progress towards a world safe from infectious disease threats and promote health security as an international priority. International organizations, technical experts, and leadership from over 40 countries as well as US government agencies from multiple sectors are collaborating to facilitate regional and global cooperation in achieving GHSA objectives of prevent, detect and respond to public health threats. - 2 International Medical Corps is one of eight NGO organizations that make up the Global Health Security Leadership Consortium
- 3 International Medical Corps, as of July 2015 is a member of the Next Generation Leadership comprised of young public health, medical and policy professionals from around the world who will advocate the principles of the GHSA and influence policy in their governments



Drawing on 30 years of experience training local health workers in the world's disaster-prone areas, International Medical Corps continues to contribute to several GHSA Action Packages globally.

International Medical Corps participates in Nationa Immunization Day campaigns around the world and incorporates routine immunizations in the provision of primary health care in over 15 countries on three continents. Furthermore, International Medical Corps has provided training for microscopists and other laboratory technicians and designed guidelines and protocols to improve laboratory systems in nine countries in Sub-Saharan Africa. For over three decades, International Medical Corps has worked with local governments and communities to improve their ability to respond to disasters including infectious diseases outbreaks by improving community surveillance and reporting public health events of international concern in Afghanistan, Cameroon, the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC), Ethiopia, Guinea-Bissau, Jordan, Mali, Pakistan, the Philippines, and Nigeria.
