International Medical Corps (UK) is an international humanitarian non-governmental organisation (NGO) with its headquarters in London. The Charity is an independent affiliate of International Medical Corps, a US registered non-profit organisation that shares the same mission. Through an Administrative Services Agreement, International Medical Corps (UK) engages International Medical Corps in the delivery and implementation of its programmes on the ground in accordance with the terms and conditions of its grants.

Throughout this report, projects and their statistics (with the exception of International Medical Corps UK financial information) are the results of combined International Medical Corps UK and International Medical Corps global efforts.





ANNUAL MESSAGE

Amid increasingly adverse humanitarian conditions, International Medical Corps UK can be proud of our achievements in 2017. During the year, we responded to crises on four continents, delivering assistance and training—saving lives and relieving suffering in some of the most challenging and hard-to-reach environments imaginable.

In several countries in the Middle East, our teams helped tens of thousands of people whose lives have been shattered because of the war in Syria. During the conflict—now in its eight year—International Medical Corps UK has aided a total of nearly 16 million people.

In Yemen, where a brutal war has rendered three out of four people in the country dependent on international humanitarian assistance for survival, International Medical Corps UK supported healthcare facilities with medical and nutrition supplies while providing hospitals with desperately needed water, securing their ability to remain operational.

On the African continent, our teams mobilised to meet the tremendous human needs caused by prolonged drought, increased levels of food insecurity and the threat of famine and disease—from the Horn of Africa in the east to Nigeria in the west.

In the northern hemisphere, International Medical Corps UK helped people in Mexico, Puerto Rico, Florida and the island nation of Dominica as earthquakes and hurricanes wrought devastation upon the populations.

Through it all, we remained faithful to a core commitment: training. Based on decades of

experience, we know that this is a key element to building resilience, helping communities to recover from disaster and emerge stronger and more confident to create better futures.

In the past year, International Medical Corps UK trained thousands of ministry of health staff, local health workers and volunteers, in 30 countries. The training covered such critical aspects of medical assistance as emergency obstetric care, proper sanitation and hygiene-habits, clean water-keeping, psychological first aid, prevention of gender-based violence and treatment of GBV survivors, and much more. Securing such skills at the community level will serve local populations long after our departure.

As we look to the inevitable challenges ahead, International Medical Corps UK expresses our deep gratitude to the friends whose support ensures that we can reach those in need. Our assistance—which all too often is a person's only access to healthcare—would not be possible were it not for committed supporters like yourself.

For that, we extend our deepest appreciation and gratitude.

OUR MISSION

International Medical Corps: A Global First Responder

We provide training and deliver emergency healthcare, together with related services, to those affected by conflict, natural disaster or disease. We do this no matter where in the world they may be or what the conditions. We train people in their own communities, providing them with the skills needed to recover, to chart their own path to self-reliance and to shape their own future as they become effective First Responders.





OUR APPROACH

Speed Saves Lives

Our Emergency Response Teams deploy fast to assist those in great need—often arriving within hours to reach those even in the most remote, challenging environments. Drawing on experience gained in more than three decades of responding to disasters on five continents, our surge capacity includes physicians and nurses trained in emergency medicine, supported by specialists in essential healthcare services ranging from mental health and psychosocial support to technical advice for addressing urgent nutrition, water, sanitation and hygiene needs.

As emergency conditions ease, we stay on, partnering with survivors to build a better future. We work with community leaders, hire and train local staff, develop partnerships and evaluate progress to ensure quality. Our staff numbers some 7,000 worldwide, with 90% recruited locally, ensuring that the knowledge and tools required to prepare for future emergencies remains anchored in the community—so that if disaster should strike again, residents can themselves be effective First Responders.

OUR PROGRAMS

From Relief to Self-Reliance

Our core strengths form the heart of our technical competence—competence we use to shape programs that enable communities hit by disaster to make their way on a journey of recovery, from relief to self-reliance. In 2017, International Medical Corps applied these core strengths to conduct successful programs that saved countless lives and eased the suffering for millions.

SOUTH SUDAN



EMERGENCY RESPONSE AND PREPAREDNESS

In **Yemen**, International Medical Corps responded to the world's largest outbreak of cholera in recent memory. In 2017, our teams supported a total of 81 cholera treatment facilities in six of the country's 23 governorates to treat and cure those who had contracted the disease. We also engaged in activities to prevent cholera and other communicable diseases.



HEALTH SERVICES SUPPORT

Our work in West and Central African countries, including **Cameroon, CAR, Chad, Nigeria, Guinea, Mali and Sierra Leone**, supported 289 primary healthcare facilities and 54 Mobile Medical Units.



FAMILY AND COMMUNITY HEALTH

In **Lebanon**, we supported vaccination coverage in refugee and host communities by administering 31,006 doses of DPT3 (diphtheria-tetanus-pertussis) to infants during their first year of life.



WOMEN'S AND CHILDREN'S HEALTH

In **Somalia**, we helped provide 20,428 women with continuous access to antenatal care.



NUTRITION AND FOOD SECURITY

In **Nigeria**, we trained 106 Ministry of Health staff and 670 community health workers in community management of acute malnutrition.



WATER SANITATION AND HYGIENE

In drought-affected **Ethiopia**, we constructed and rehabilitated 138 water sources to provide communities with access to safe water for drinking and hygiene.



MENTAL HEALTH AND PSYCHOSOCIAL SUPPORT

In **Syria**, our teams provided mental health and psychosocial support services to 3,848 individuals—more than half of them children.

Training underpins all that we do

Since beginning our lifesaving work in 1984, training has been an essential part of what we do. The level of our commitment to training and the depth of our experience in passing key skills and knowledge to local communities help bring those recovering from disaster closer to their goal of self-reliance.

JORDAN

OUR WORK IN 2017 UNDERSCORED THE PRIORITY WE PLACE IN TRAINING:

Skilled International Medical Corps staff introduced the concept of psychological first aid (PFA) to 395 local healthcare professionals, including physicians, nurses, midwives and healthcare specialists from three national ministries and departments. Our training provided insights on some of the most common psychological responses individuals develop in the wake of direct exposure to distressing, often violent, events. We shared knowledge on how to support those affected and how to connect distressed individuals to the services they need. The training was viewed as essential to adequately sensitise health professionals to the growing need for PFA in a country that has taken in more than 650,000 refugees in recent years, most of them fleeing the horrors of war in neighbouring Syria.

NIGERIA

In 2017, hunger and the fear of famine darkened the lives of residents in the country's northeastern regions despite their recent freedom from long years of Boko Haram rule. We conducted training for more than 1,400 health professionals and community members in the community-level management of acute malnutrition (CMAM). Among those trained were staff members of Nigeria's Ministry of Health, local community health workers and members of our own staff. The knowledge conveyed through the training led to increased accuracy in the initial assessment of malnutrition, a rise in referrals by community nutrition volunteers to Outpatient Therapeutic Programs and fewer errors in data collection. In women's-care support groups, more information and counselling on malnutrition was passed to pregnant women and new mothers by mothers leading the groups who had undergone training.

SOUTH SUDAN

International Medical Corps trained more than 200 health workers employed mainly in clinics and hospitals in northern areas of the country, providing them with important skills on preventing infection, communicable diseases and malnutrition. Training was conducted in the towns of Nyal, Maban and Malakal, where some of the worst fighting and subsequent displacements of the country's ongoing civil war have occurred. Specifics of the training included conveying to Community Health Workers the ability to identify and refer cases of malnourishment found at the community level and how to refer them to sites offering specialised treatment; how to prevent and reduce dissemination of infections common to health facilities; and key messaging on how to prevent cholera.



BY THE NUMBERS

In 2017, International Medical Corps responded to the humanitarian needs of millions of people in crisis on four continents. Among the results of our work:



4.8 MILLION

Additionally, we estimate that our work in 2017 indirectly benefited 50 MILLION people residing within our programs' zone of influence.

Including mobile clinics serving remote rural areas, village health posts and large urban hospitals—collectively, these health facilities form the heart of a nation's healthcare system.

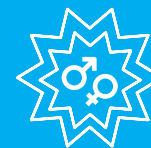

Approximately 90.09% of these resources went directly to program activities, reflecting International Medical Corps' deep and enduring commitment to fiscal responsibility and efficiency.

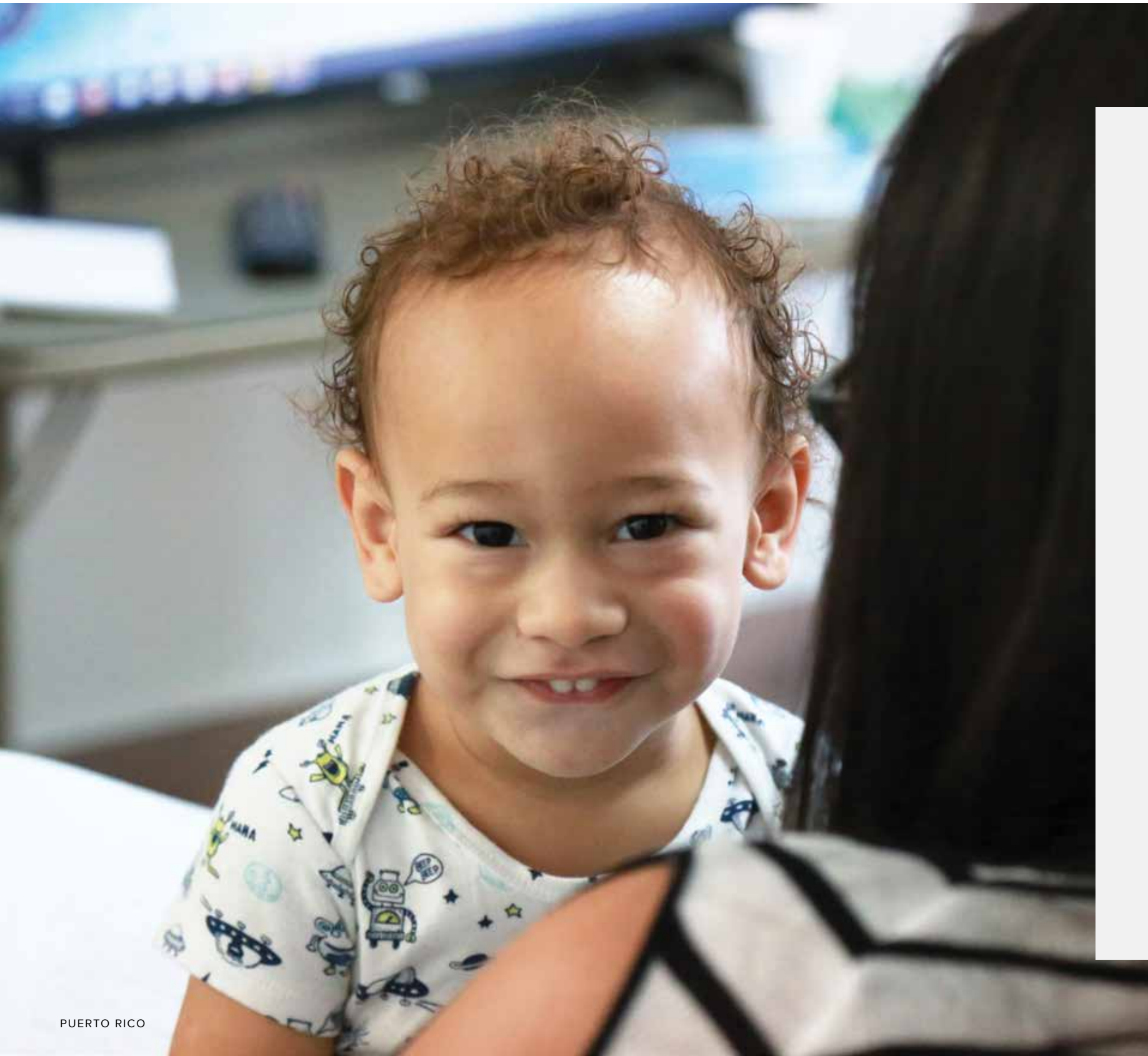
