

## SITUATION UPDATE

Hostilities across the Middle East remain intense, driving continued displacement, casualties and mounting pressure on essential services, with children among the most affected. In Lebanon, displacement has surged to nearly 1.2 million people—including 390,000 children—with 141,400 people currently living in 709 collective shelters and the majority of those displaced remaining dispersed across host communities or residing in informal, unstable settings with limited access to basic service.

### International Medical Corps Response

International Medical Corps is at the forefront of the humanitarian health response across the Middle East, delivering critical, lifesaving care at scale to affected populations. Our extensive regional footprint and operational capacity are detailed in [previous Situation Reports](#) and our [regional Capability Statement](#). All of our staff are currently accounted for and safe.

The health system in Lebanon is nearing breaking point, strained by overwhelming demand and ongoing disruptions to service delivery. Repeated attacks on healthcare facilities, personnel and supply lines have further eroded capacity. The World Health Organization has confirmed 133 such incidents, resulting in 87 fatalities and 192 injuries among patients and health workers. As a result, six hospitals and 59 primary healthcare centers (PHCCs) have been forced to shut down, while at least 16 additional facilities have been damaged, further restricting access to care.

To support the ongoing emergency response, International Medical Corps continues to coordinate closely with the Ministry of Public Health (MoPH), the Public Health Emergency Operations Center, National Disaster Risk Management Units and other humanitarian partners at national and subnational levels.

All PHCCs supported by International Medical Corps are providing free consultations to displaced populations, with 7,752 consultations delivered to date. Working in close coordination with the MoPH, our mobile primary satellite units (PSUs) are extending services directly to displacement sites, helping to maintain access to care for affected communities. ### OUR FOOTPRINT

- International Medical Corps operates across the Middle East, delivering lifesaving assistance in high-risk settings.
- In 2025, we delivered 1.84 million health consultations in Syria, 543,088 in Lebanon, 154,411 in Jordan's Azraq and Zaatari camps and 388,647 in Yemen. Since January 2024, we have provided more than 1 million consultations and non-medical services through three field hospitals in Gaza.

### OUR RESPONSE

- In Lebanon, our 29 mobile primary satellite units (PSUs) have reached 110 shelters, delivering 8,518 consultations, 4,611 acute and 1,003 chronic treatments, 1,532 health awareness sessions, 543 referrals and 170 vaccinations. We also have reached 491 people with nutrition screening and support, 438 with psychosocial support and 343 households with hygiene kits.
- Across the region, we continue to deliver uninterrupted lifesaving health, nutrition, mental health, protection and water services through field hospitals, mobile and fixed facilities, and integrated programs, with capacity to rapidly expand these services as needs evolve.

April 14, 29 PSUs have covered 110 collective and community-run shelters, including those under the Ministry of Social Affairs.

Since the onset of the escalation, our mobile teams have conducted 8,518 consultations, distributed acute medications to 4,611 people and chronic treatments to 1,003 people, and delivered health awareness sessions reaching 1,532 people. We have referred 534 patients for advanced care, primarily for diagnostic support, and have provided routine vaccinations to 170 children.

We have reached 491 children under 5 and pregnant or breastfeeding women with targeted nutrition screening, providing 219 people with nutritional supplementation. We are implementing mental health and psychosocial support (MHPSS) services in coordination with the National Mental Health Programme, reaching 438 people with non-specialized support and psychological first aid, and providing remote and in-person case management and specialized interventions. We also have provided 343 households in shelters across the South and Beirut-Mount Lebanon with hygiene kits to address immediate needs.

With additional funding, International Medical Corps is positioned to further expand our response, including expanding PSU outreach, covering hospitalization costs for the most vulnerable, and increasing delivery of health, MHPSS, protection and non-food item assistance to displaced populations.

Across the broader region, humanitarian needs remain critical as conflict dynamics continue to affect multiple countries. In Gaza, mass displacement and constrained access to essential services persist. In Syria, renewed instability is compounding existing vulnerabilities. In Yemen, protracted crisis conditions continue to drive food insecurity and restrict access to healthcare. In Iraq, ongoing pockets of insecurity and displacement, combined with pressure on basic services, continue to affect at-risk populations. Against this backdrop, International Medical Corps is equipped to respond rapidly through established emergency mechanisms, ensuring timely, targeted assistance across contexts.
