

SITUATION UPDATE

Despite the extension of the ceasefire in Lebanon by three weeks, the humanitarian situation continues to remain dire. Ongoing attacks continue to block most displaced people from returning, while many who attempted to go back have been forced to flee again due to evacuation orders and renewed violence.

International Medical Corps Response

International Medical Corps continues to deliver large-scale, lifesaving health services across the Middle East, reaching populations affected by ongoing crises. Our regional presence and operational reach are set out in [previous Situation Reports](#) and [regional Capability Statement](#). All personnel remain safe and accounted for.

The health system in Lebanon is under intense pressure. Attacks on facilities and staff, combined with surging demand for primary and secondary care, are pushing services to the brink. As of April 27, the World Health Organization had verified 149 attacks on healthcare, 100 deaths and 233 injuries involving patients and health workers. Four hospitals and 46 primary healthcare centers remain out of service.

Displacement continues at scale. As of April 27, some 112,100 people are sheltering across 625 collective sites, according to the Disaster Risk Management Unit, while more than 1 million people are registered as displaced.

To support the ongoing emergency response, International Medical Corps is coordinating closely with the Ministry of Public Health, the Public Health Emergency Operations Center, National Disaster Risk Management Units and humanitarian partners at national and subnational levels.

All primary healthcare centers supported by International Medical Corps are providing free consultations to displaced populations. In addition, our mobile primary satellite units are delivering essential care directly to shelters and displacement sites, maintaining access in hard-to-reach areas. As of April 27, 31 units had covered 115 shelters.

FAST FACTS

- In Lebanon, more than 1 million people have registered as internally displaced. Among them, about 112,100 people are currently living in 625 collective shelters.

OUR FOOTPRINT

- International Medical Corps delivers frontline assistance across the Middle East, operating in complex and volatile environments.
- In 2025, we carried out 1.84 million health consultations in Syria, 543,088 in Lebanon, 154,411 in Jordan's Azraq and Zaatari camps, and 388,647 in Yemen. Since January 2024, our three field hospitals in Gaza have provided more than 1 million consultations and related services.

OUR RESPONSE

- In Lebanon, 31 mobile teams have reached 115 shelters, providing 11,317 consultations, 6,119 acute treatments and 1,332 chronic-care services. Teams have also delivered 2,115 health awareness sessions, referred 702 patients for advanced care and vaccinated 227 children. We have screened and supported 650 people through nutrition programs, delivered psychosocial support to 583 people and distributed 760 hygiene kits.
- Across the region, we continue to deliver essential services in health, nutrition, mental health, protection and water through a mix of field hospitals and mobile and fixed platforms, with the ability to expand rapidly as needs grow.

Since the escalation began, our mobile teams have delivered 11,317 consultations, provided acute medications to 6,119 people and chronic treatments to 1,332 people, and reached 2,115 people through health awareness sessions. Teams have referred 702 patients for advanced care, mainly for diagnostic services, and administered routine vaccinations to 227 children.

Our nutrition teams have screened 650 children under 5 and pregnant or breastfeeding women, with 324 receiving supplementations. Our mental health teams, which are delivering services in coordination with the National Mental Health Programme, have reached 583 people with psychological first aid and non-specialized support, alongside structured case management and specialized care delivered both remotely and in person. Teams have also distributed 760 hygiene kits across shelters to meet urgent needs.

Across the region, humanitarian conditions remain extremely fragile. In Gaza, large-scale displacement continues alongside near-total constraints on access to essential services. In Syria, protracted conflict and uneven service access continue to erode resilience. In Yemen, years of crisis are driving acute food insecurity and limiting access to healthcare. In Iraq, recurring insecurity, ongoing displacement and overstretched public services are sustaining high levels of vulnerability.

International Medical Corps remains fully mobilized to respond at scale, using established emergency systems to deliver fast, targeted and lifesaving assistance across the region.
