

SITUATION UPDATE

Despite the extension of the ceasefire and renewed diplomatic efforts, the situation in Lebanon continues to worsen. Renewed and expanded attacks have triggered further displacement, while escalating insecurity has disrupted humanitarian operations. Increasing attacks on healthcare and persistent constraints on access continue to hinder the delivery of lifesaving assistance.

International Medical Corps Response

International Medical Corps is continuing to deliver lifesaving health services at scale across the Middle East, supporting communities affected by conflict, displacement and worsening humanitarian conditions. Our regional presence and operational reach are set out in [previous Situation Reports](#) and in our [regional Capability Statement](#). All personnel remain safe and accounted for.

Lebanon's healthcare system remains under severe strain. Continued attacks on healthcare facilities and workers, combined with growing demand for emergency and routine care, are pushing already overstretched services beyond capacity. As of June 1, the World Health Organization had verified 190 attacks on healthcare facilities, patients and medical personnel, resulting in 128 deaths and 332 injuries. Nearly one-quarter of these incidents have occurred since the April 17 ceasefire. In the past week alone, 11 attacks killed four healthcare workers and injured 24 others. Three hospitals and 43 primary healthcare centers remain closed, while many others are operating with reduced capacity.

Displacement remains widespread across the country. According to the Disaster Risk Management Unit, more than 132,000 people were sheltering in 633 collective sites in Lebanon as of June 1, while more than 1 million people remain displaced nationwide.

International Medical Corps continues to coordinate closely with the Ministry of Public Health, the Public Health Emergency Operations Center, National Disaster Risk Management Units and humanitarian partners to sustain and strengthen the nationwide emergency response.

OUR RESPONSE

- Across the region, International Medical Corps sustains integrated health, nutrition, mental health, protection and WASH programming through mobile teams, field hospitals and fixed facilities, with established systems in place to expand rapidly as needs intensify.
- In Lebanon, 35 mobile medical teams have operated across 135 shelters and community sites, delivering 17,282 consultations, treating 8,786 acute cases and managing 2,026 chronic conditions. Teams have also conducted health awareness sessions for 3,102 people, referred 1,089 patients for higher-level care and vaccinated 262 children.
- Nutrition teams have screened 986 children and pregnant or breastfeeding women for malnutrition, while mental health teams reached more than 1,000 people with psychosocial and psychological support services. In addition, teams distributed 2,168 hygiene kits to displaced and vulnerable households.

All International Medical Corps-supported primary healthcare centers continue to provide free consultations for displaced families. Mobile medical teams are delivering frontline services directly to shelters and displacement sites, maintaining access to care in underserved and hard-to-reach communities. As of June 1, 35 mobile teams reached 135 shelters and community locations.

Since the escalation of conflict began, International Medical Corps-supported teams have conducted 17,282 medical consultations, provided medications for acute conditions to 8,786 people, delivered chronic disease treatment to 2,026 people and reached 3,102 people through health awareness sessions. Teams have also referred 1,089 patients for specialized care and administered routine vaccinations to 262 children.

International Medical Corps nutrition teams continue to identify and address acute vulnerabilities among high-risk groups. To date, teams have screened 986 children under 5 and pregnant or breastfeeding women for malnutrition, with 543 of them receiving nutritional support. Mental health and psychosocial support services remain a core component of our response, reaching more than 1,000 people through psychological first aid, counselling, case management and specialized interventions delivered both in person and remotely. To help reduce public health risks in displacement settings, teams have also distributed 2,168 hygiene kits.

Across the wider region, humanitarian needs remain severe. Across Gaza, ongoing hostilities, repeated displacement and the collapse of critical infrastructure continue to drive immense humanitarian need. In Syria, years of conflict have left communities struggling with limited access to essential services and healthcare. Yemen faces worsening food insecurity and shrinking access to basic care, while vulnerable populations in Iraq continue to contend with the effects of displacement, insecurity and strained public systems.

International Medical Corps continues to adapt and scale our response across the region, drawing on decades of operational experience, strong local partnerships and established emergency response mechanisms to deliver timely, effective and lifesaving assistance.
