

## SITUATION UPDATE

Military operations and expanded evacuation orders have continued over the past weeks, despite the ongoing diplomatic efforts, with more than 3,700 people killed and 11,600 injured since the beginning of the hostilities. The humanitarian situation remains extremely dire, and the ability of the displaced populations to return continues to be hampered by insecurity and damages to both private and public infrastructure.

### International Medical Corps Response

International Medical Corps is continuing to deliver lifesaving health services at scale across the Middle East, supporting communities affected by conflict, displacement and worsening humanitarian conditions. Our regional presence and operational reach are set out in [previous Situation Reports](#) and in our [regional Capability Statement](#). All personnel remain safe and accounted for.

Lebanon's healthcare system remains under severe strain.

Continued attacks on healthcare facilities and workers, combined with growing demand for emergency and routine care, are pushing already overstretched services beyond capacity.

As of June 15, the World Health Organization had verified 204 attacks on healthcare facilities, supplies, patients and medical personnel, resulting in 135 deaths and 404 injuries as well as the closure of three hospitals and 43 primary healthcare centers. Almost 30% of these incidents have occurred since the initial ceasefire was announced on April 17.

Displacement remains widespread across the country. According to the Disaster Risk Management Unit, more than 134,900 people were sheltering in 646 collective sites in Lebanon as of June 14, while more than 1 million people remain displaced nationwide.

International Medical Corps continues to coordinate closely with the Ministry of Public Health, the Public Health Emergency Operations Center, National Disaster Risk Management Units and humanitarian partners to sustain and strengthen the nationwide emergency response.

### FAST FACTS

- More than 1 million people remain displaced, including more than 134,900 people sheltering in 646 collective sites. Escalating insecurity continues to restrict humanitarian access and block safe returns.

### OUR FOOTPRINT

- International Medical Corps maintains a wide operational presence across the Middle East, delivering lifesaving assistance in active conflict zones and high-risk environments.

### OUR RESPONSE

- Across the region, International Medical Corps sustains integrated health, nutrition, mental health, protection, and water, sanitation and hygiene programming through mobile teams, field hospitals and fixed facilities, with established systems in place to expand rapidly as needs intensify.
- In Lebanon, 36 mobile medical teams have operated across 139 shelters and community sites, delivering 20,208 consultations, treating 10,399 acute cases and managing 2,213 chronic conditions. Teams have also conducted health awareness sessions for 3,237 people, referred 1,249 patients for higher-level care and vaccinated 268 children.
- Nutrition teams have screened 1,049 children and pregnant or breastfeeding women for malnutrition, while mental health teams have reached 1,391 people with psychosocial and psychological support services. In addition, teams have distributed 2,438 hygiene kits to displaced and vulnerable households and individuals.

All International Medical Corps-supported primary healthcare centers continue to provide free consultations for displaced families. As of June 15, 36 mobile teams linked to our supported health facilities have reached 139 shelters and community locations, delivering healthcare services to displaced and underserved populations.

Since March 3, International Medical Corps-supported teams have conducted 20,208 medical consultations, provided medications for acute conditions to 10,399 people, delivered chronic disease treatment to 2,213 people and reached 3,237 people through health awareness sessions. Teams have also referred 1,249 patients for specialized care and administered routine vaccinations to 268 children.

International Medical Corps' nutrition teams continue to identify and address acute vulnerabilities among high-risk groups. To date, teams have screened 1,049 children under 5 and pregnant or breastfeeding women for malnutrition, with 598 of them receiving nutritional support. Mental health and psychosocial support services provided by mobile teams have reached 1,391 people, including through psychological first aid, counselling, case management and awareness sessions. To help reduce public health risks, teams have distributed 2,438 hygiene kits.

Across the Middle East region, humanitarian needs remain critical and deeply complex. In Gaza, the ongoing crisis, repeated displacement and the devastation of critical infrastructure continue to leave millions in urgent need of support across multiple sectors. In Syria, fragile institutions and an uncertain political environment have weakened the delivery of essential services while increasing protection concerns for vulnerable communities. Yemen continues to face rising levels of acute food insecurity and reduced access to basic care.

International Medical Corps continues to adapt our operations across the region, drawing on decades of experience, trusted local partnerships and well-established emergency response systems. This enables us to deliver timely, effective and lifesaving assistance to communities affected by crisis, while remaining responsive to evolving humanitarian needs.
