

SITUATION UPDATE

Despite the reduction in military activities over the past weeks, the consequences of the protracted conflict and displacement, loss of livelihoods and contamination from unexploded ordnances continue to negatively affect access to basic services and delivery of humanitarian assistance.

International Medical Corps Response

International Medical Corps is continuing to deliver lifesaving health services at scale across the Middle East, supporting communities affected by conflict, displacement and worsening humanitarian conditions. Our regional presence and operational reach are set out in [previous Situation Reports](#) and in our [regional Capability Statement](#). All personnel remain safe and accounted for.

Lebanon's healthcare system remains under severe strain. As of June 29, the World Health Organization had verified 211 attacks on healthcare facilities, supplies, patients and medical personnel, resulting in 135 deaths and 406 injuries, as well as the closure of three hospitals and 35 primary healthcare centers. Fortunately, no attacks have been recorded since June 22.

According to the Ministry of Social Affairs and the Disaster Risk Management Unit, since mid-June the number of people registered as displaced has fallen to 704,445, with 59,700 being hosted in shelters, compared with 140,000 being hosted in shelters in previous periods.

However, humanitarian needs continue to be severe due to multiple factors, including the destruction of vital infrastructure, loss of livelihoods, damage to homes and the impossibility for return of the populations displaced from areas within security zones.

International Medical Corps continues to coordinate closely with the Ministry of Public Health, the Public Health Emergency Operations Center, the National Disaster Risk Management Unit and humanitarian partners to sustain and strengthen the nationwide emergency response.

- The number of registered displaced people in Lebanon has fallen to 704,445 and occupancy in the shelters has decreased by more than 50%.

- International Medical Corps maintains a wide operational presence across the Middle East, delivering lifesaving assistance in active conflict zones and high-risk environments.

OUR RESPONSE

- Across the region, International Medical Corps sustains integrated health, nutrition, mental health, protection, and water, sanitation and hygiene programming through mobile teams, field hospitals and fixed facilities, with established systems in place to expand rapidly as needs intensify.
- In Lebanon, 37 mobile medical teams have operated across 143 shelters and community sites, delivering 22,524 consultations, treating 11,809 acute cases and managing 2,516 chronic conditions. Teams have also conducted health awareness sessions for 3,389 people, referred 1,324 patients to specialized care and vaccinated 271 children.
- Nutrition teams have screened 1,138 children and pregnant or breastfeeding women for malnutrition, while mental health teams have reached 1,612 people with psychosocial and psychological support services. In addition, teams have distributed 2,485 hygiene kits to displaced and vulnerable households and individuals.

All International Medical Corps-supported primary healthcare centers continue to provide free consultations for displaced families. As of June 29, 37 mobile teams linked to our supported health facilities have reached 143 shelters and community locations, delivering healthcare services to displaced and underserved populations.

Since March 3, International Medical Corps-supported teams have conducted 22,524 medical consultations, provided medications for acute conditions to 11,809 people, delivered chronic disease treatment to 2,516 people and reached 3,389 people through health awareness sessions. Teams have also referred 1,324 patients for specialized care and administered routine vaccinations to 271 children.

International Medical Corps' nutrition teams continue to identify and address acute vulnerabilities among high-risk groups. To date, teams have screened 1,138 children under 5 and pregnant or breastfeeding women for malnutrition, with 708 of them receiving nutritional support. Mental health and psychosocial support services provided by mobile teams have reached 1,612 people, including through psychological first aid, counselling, case management and awareness sessions. To help reduce public health risks, teams have distributed 2,485 hygiene kits.

Across the Middle East region, humanitarian needs remain critical and deeply complex. In Gaza, the ongoing crisis, repeated displacement and the devastation of critical infrastructure continue to leave millions in urgent need of support across multiple sectors. In Syria, fragile institutions and an uncertain political environment have weakened the delivery of essential services while increasing protection concerns for vulnerable communities. Yemen continues to face rising levels of acute food insecurity and reduced access to basic care.

International Medical Corps continues to adapt our operations across the region, drawing on decades of experience, trusted local partnerships and well-established emergency response systems. This enables us to deliver timely, effective and lifesaving assistance to communities affected by crisis, while remaining responsive to evolving humanitarian needs.
