



Yemen

Yemen's prolonged conflict has created one of the world's worst humanitarian crises, with more than half of the country's 43 million people requiring humanitarian assistance.

Since 2012, International Medical Corps has provided integrated health, nutrition, protection, cash and voucher assistance, and water, sanitation and hygiene (WASH) services to address immediate humanitarian needs while strengthening resilience and supporting the continuity of essential services. In addition, we integrate mental health and psychosocial support (MHPSS) across all program areas to ensure a comprehensive and people-centered approach to humanitarian response and recovery.

Maintaining a strong presence across northern and southern Yemen, we provide direct services while working with community-based organizations, women-led groups and government institutions to expand access to quality services. By helping local actors, we strengthen communities' resilience, self-reliance and capacity to withstand recurrent shocks and vulnerabilities in a protracted crisis.



Healthcare

In Yemen, International Medical Corps strengthens the public health system by collaborating with authorities to improve the quality and accessibility of essential services. We support the capacity-building and mentorship of healthcare workers, provide essential medical commodities and strengthen health-information systems.

Our health programming prioritizes maternal, newborn and child health—for example, we use AI-enabled point-of-care ultrasound technology to support the early detection of high-risk pregnancies to improve health outcomes. We also strengthen routine immunization, support the expanded program on immunization (EPI) to increase vaccination coverage, and reinforce community-based disease surveillance, early-warning systems and surge capacities for such outbreaks as cholera and measles.

To sustain essential services, we improve the functionality of health facilities through rehabilitation, referral systems and solar-energy solutions.

Our mobile medical teams reach displaced and underserved communities, while our community engagement and health-promotion activities build local capacity to prevent, withstand and recover from health emergencies.



In 2025, International Medical Corps reached **more than 400,000 people** through integrated programs across the country.

Nutrition

International Medical Corps supports a model of integrated nutrition interventions to address the immediate and underlying causes of malnutrition.

We support the treatment of acute malnutrition among children under 5 and pregnant and lactating women (PLWs) through community management of acute malnutrition and management of at-risk mothers and infants (MAMI) under 6 months. In 2025, we screened 39,576 children under 5 and 18,024 PLWs for malnutrition. Our outreach teams screen, refer and follow up on malnutrition cases while promoting positive behavior change to improve nutrition outcomes and strengthen community resilience.

We provide counseling to caregivers to promote optimal feeding practices during the first 1,000 days of life, as well as supplementary nutritious local foods for children most at risk of malnutrition. We also provide targeted cash assistance to help affected families meet their nutritional needs.



Water, Sanitation and Hygiene

We integrate engineering expertise, public health approaches, and cost-effective and innovative technologies to provide WASH services that are resilient, even in the face of extreme weather. Our support includes the rehabilitation and construction of sustainable WASH infrastructure, distribution of clean and safe water, renewable energy solutions—including the solarization of water systems and health facilities—advanced water treatment and automated chlorination technology, evidence-based approaches to water-quality optimization and promotion of healthy WASH practices.

We prioritize safe sanitation, infection prevention and control (IPC), and safe waste management to reduce public health risks and improve the quality of essential services while safeguarding community health.



In 2025, we distributed **6.8 million liters of clean water** to communities.



Protection

We place the protection of the people we serve at the center of our humanitarian response by prioritizing safety and dignity, meaningful access to services, participation and human rights.

In response to violence against women and children, we provide such services as case management, livelihood support and targeted cash assistance. In partnership with women-led organizations and the Ministry of Social Affairs and Labor, we strengthen local ownership and community-led solutions. By integrating protection and livelihoods, we help at-risk women and children to become self-reliant, reduce negative coping mechanisms and recover with dignity.

Well-being and MHPSS are core pillars of our protection programming. Through integrated and community-based approaches, we strengthen health and community systems to provide safe, accessible and quality MHPSS services while promoting resilience, early identification of mental health needs and timely referrals to specialized care.



Capacity Building

Strengthening the capacity of institutional and local workforces is at the core of our programming, enabling national and local actors to provide high-quality, accountable and sustainable services.

We ensure the development of sustainable workforces and improve service quality through mentoring, peer learning and digital self-learning platforms.

In 2025, we trained 416 frontline workers on such programs as the EMOTIVE bundle, point-of-care ultrasound, postpartum hemorrhage, neonatal resuscitation, bubble CPAP technology, emergency obstetric and newborn care, EPI, the Mental Health Gap Action Programme, MAMI, protection principles and IPC measures. We also trained 250 community volunteers on social behavior-change approaches.

Localization and Partnerships

We are committed to advancing locally led action in Yemen through equitable partnerships with national and community-based organizations, women-led groups, government institutions, and academic and research entities. We invest in local leadership, technical capacity, organizational development and resource mobilization to strengthen sustainable service delivery. We also mentor local partners to help them lead humanitarian, recovery and development-linked initiatives.

Operational Excellence

Our long-term presence in the country has enabled rapid emergency response when needed while supporting recovery and systems strengthening. Through risk-management systems, digital innovation, local partnerships, integrated multisectoral programming and community-centered approaches, we deliver effective, accountable and cost-efficient programs that strengthen resilience for communities across Yemen.
